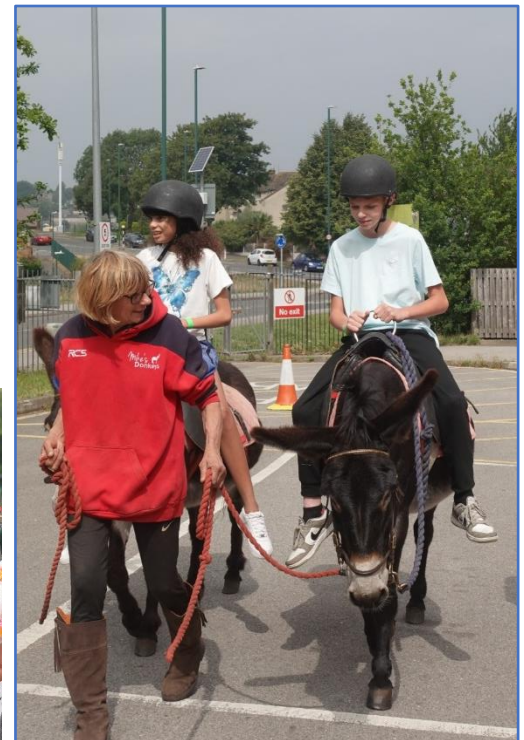

Attendance and Punctuality

Absences do affect how well children do in school. On the face of it, 90% attendance looks reasonable. But if you stretch that out over a child's time in school, 90% from Reception to Y9 means that a child has missed an entire school year! Normally, lessons in school are progressive. At the start of a new topic, children learn the first ideas and 'building blocks' which are then built on over time, to help each child secure their knowledge and skills. Later, more advanced lessons rely on this earlier understanding to move the children forward. Absences cause gaps in children's understanding which then have to be filled in. Essentially, they're playing catch-up.

For every school, the issue of children's absences is always difficult; but please be assured that our intent here is not to upset anyone, nor to be heavy-handed or awkward. Our intent is to keep you informed about our duty to your children as learners, yourselves as parents and also to the authorities that regulate school. We implore anyone who is struggling to get their child into school to contact their child's class teacher initially (and then the Attendance Officer if the situation doesn't improve) to discuss the reasons and work on ways to improve attendance.



All holidays are unauthorised. We will be notifying the Council of any extended holidays which could lead to penalties and fines.

Curriculum Impact



Communication, Language and literacy

As you know, a positive 'reading culture' has been established at Rosehill for many years and is clearly evident around the school and in discussions with the pupils. As well as offering a wide range of books we also use multi-sensory reading, which involves engaging multiple senses beyond just sight and hearing to enhance the reading experience and improve comprehension. This approach is particularly beneficial for individuals who learn best through tactile, kinaesthetic, or other sensory experiences.

I would like to thank the school Librarians for their integral role in supporting the children in accessing excellent books, and providing a sense of value and enjoyment from reading. Parents can also do this through listening to their children reading at home, as well as reading to their children regularly. Together we are having a massive impact on our pupils' reading and enjoyment of reading and books.

Marvellous Makers

Nottingham City, challenge every city child to read 6 books over the summer holidays! All they need to do is visit a city library to register and start reading. They can collect stickers along the way and if they complete the challenge, they will receive a certificate and an invite to a medal ceremony to be awarded their medal in September. School Choir

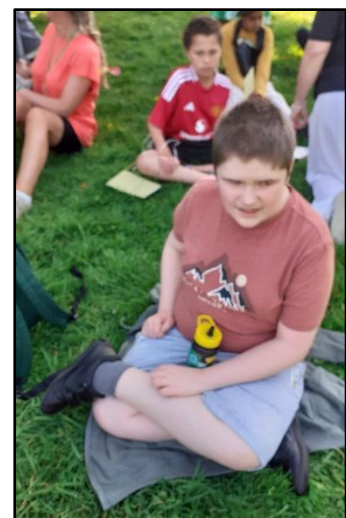

Personal Development, Health and Emotional Wellbeing Careers

In the summer term, Upper School students had a visit by the fire service to tell us all about a career as a fire fighter. The fire fighters told us about their jobs and showed us the equipment in the fire engines. The students were especially interested in the larger equipment such as the hose and the "Jaws of Life". This is a nickname for a set of hydraulic rescue tools, primarily used by firefighters and emergency personnel to free people trapped in vehicles after accidents. Some students made the difficult climb into the fire engine to understand what it might feel like. Our visit ended suddenly when the fire fighters had to zoom off to rescue someone. What a great morning we had!

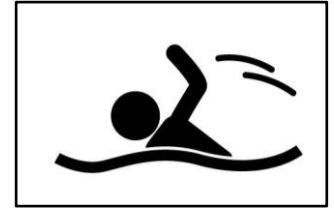


Duke of Edinburgh Award

Some of our pupils have taken part in the Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award throughout the year. As part of the programme, the pupils have developed a life skill, a sport, volunteering activities at school and they have completed a 2-day expedition. Over the 2 days, the pupils walked 8.5km around Sherwood Forest and Rushcliffe Country Park. They all did so well and have been awarded their Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Certificate.

Swimming

Swimming is an important life skill that Rosehill School is proud to provide for pupils. 24 pupils from Primary School have accessed swimming throughout the year and developed their confidence in the water. In addition to the statutory



swimming sessions for key stage 2 pupils, the Sports Coach has worked with a number of health services to provide health promotion swimming sessions for another group of 16 pupils. These sessions have helped improve fitness, physical activity levels, healthy lifestyle choices and have improved mental health and wellbeing, as well as supporting each pupil's individual health needs. Some pupils have gained their swimming badges, which is such a great achievement!

Update from Miss Tomlinson

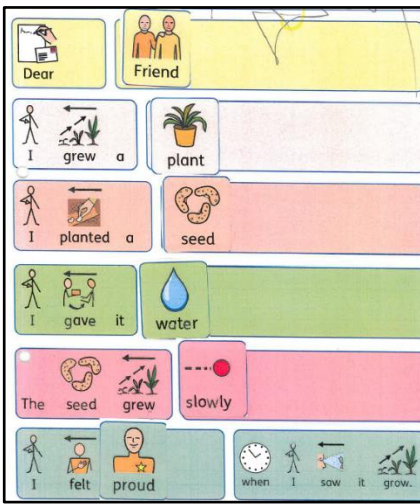

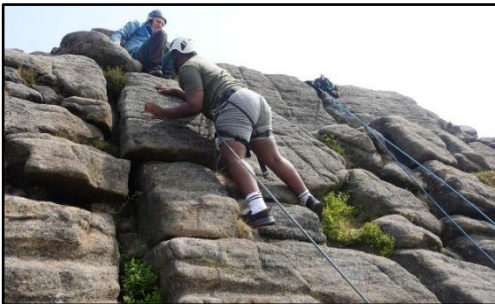

School Meals - Price Increase from September 2025

We have been informed from Nottingham City Catering department that the price of school meals will be increasing from 1st September 2025 to £2.90 per meal for KS1/KS2 (£14.50 per week) and £3.00 per meal for KS3-KS5 (£15.00 per week). Please send all dinner money in an envelope clearly labelled with your child's name. There will continue to be an emphasis on healthy eating. Please contact the school office on 0115 9155815 if you require further information regarding an application for free school meals.

Nut Free School

We have a number of children in school with **severe nut allergies** and are therefore a nut free school. In order to ensure that our pupils are safe during the school day it is vitally important that the following foods are not included in pupil's packed lunches or brought in as snacks. Please do not send peanuts in any form e.g., peanut butter or snack bars containing peanuts. Please do not make sandwiches using seeded bread, rolls with sesame seed topping, bread sticks with sesame, hummus or any products containing tahini or snack bars containing sesame. If you are unsure then all products show clearly on ingredients any allergen contents. Children suffering from such allergies can be affected and then become seriously ill very quickly after accidentally eating, touching or coming into contact with surfaces which have been contaminated with nuts and sesame. Thank you for your support ensuring the safety of our children.

Expansion Plans

Families will be aware of the proposal to expand Rosehill onto an additional site at the following address: Trent Lane, Nottingham, NG2 4DT. This would involve redeveloping the previously named Waterside School, into an additional site for Rosehill School, which is located approximately 1.8 miles from its existing site. Next term, the local authority will be completing a consultation with the school community. We will keep you updated on developments.
