Home Learning & Remote Provision Information for Parents and Carers

This information is intended to provide clarity and transparency to pupils and parents or carers about what to expect from home/remote learning.

What is taught to pupils at home?

We are keen that all our pupils continue to learn if they remain at home, where possible, but we do understand that there may be challenges for parents and carers with this.

As part of our home learning offer, we want to share with you, information to help your child to develop their confidence in learning at home, so that we are working together to support their learning skills during this time.

What should my child expect from home learning in the first day or two of pupils remaining at home?

- We will talk with parents/carers and where possible children and young people about any work they may have done so far at home and to resolve any issues arising from working at home.
- We will explain how home/remote learning will work with classes and individuals.
- We will explain how we can make sure any online sessions are safe for all concerned.

Following the first few days of home learning, will my child be taught broadly the same curriculum as they would if they were in school?

- Learning at home will be set to be meaningful, personalised and ambitious, in line with the school curriculum to reflect the topics that your child would be learning in school.
- English and Maths work will be sent home to support and reinforce your child's learning.
- Subjects will be delivered in our usual cross-curricular way, linking with subjects such as the arts and humanities.
- The teacher may arrange with you online interactive sessions via zoom or teams where appropriate.
- If we arrange remotely learning, we will aim to cover the same content of the curriculum we are delivering in school wherever possible and appropriate.

Home learning and study time each day

How long can I expect work set by the school to take my child each day?

- We understand that our pupils access learning in different ways to mainstream schools, hence their need for specialist provision and therefore there is a higher level of support required.
- As discussed with your teacher, we encourage all parents/carers to support home learning, however length of learning time per day can be discussed with the class teacher.
- If you have any concerns or feedback, please discuss this with your class teacher.

Accessing remote learning

How will my child access any online remote education being provided?

- Our remote access platform is Microsoft Teams and Zoom.
- Learning will also be provided via Purple Mash.

If my child does not have digital or online access at home, how will you support them to access remote education?

We recognise that some pupils may not have suitable online access at home. We take the following approaches to support those pupils to access remote education:

- We will issue or loan laptops or tablets to pupils where needed and direct parents or carers on where they can find more information.
- We will issue or loan devices that enable an internet connection (for example, routers or dongles), and direct parents or carers on where they can find more information.
- We can post any printed materials needed if they do not have online access.
- We will talk to you about how to submit work to teachers if they do not have online access.

How will my child be taught at home?

A wide and blended range of resources and approaches are used to deliver home learning:

- Printed learning packs produced by teachers (e.g., workbooks, worksheets).
- Teaching and learning materials such as text book, story/reading books, writing tools and sensory equipment will be provided if required.
- Communication books, timetables, now & next boards and/or other alternative and augmentative communication tailored for individual pupils.
- Learning targets and feedback sheets (teachers will provide individual pupil targets and a working from home record of learning tool).
- Live teaching (online lessons via TEAMS or Zoom).
- Recorded teaching (e.g., video/audio recordings made by teachers).
- Platforms and online tools- Purple Mash and Rosehill School website.

- Commercially available websites supporting the teaching of specific subjects or areas, including video clips or sequences (BBC bitesize, Oak Academy).
- Phone calls and email support and guidance.
- Instruction manuals and how to guides.

If at any time, your child is attending school on a reduced timetable i.e., for medical health reasons, the school will also offer learning from home.

Engagement and feedback

What are your expectations for my child's engagement and the support that we as parents and carers should provide at home?

- Each child is different, we recommend having a separate area to work, regular breaks, lots of positive feedback and support. We recommend setting routines to support your child's education.
- Each family have received a home learning guide which provides advice on how they can support their child at home.
- The teacher will communicate clearly and regularly with home in regards to the learning, ensuring expectations are appropriate and clear. We will also ensure that any issues are addressed and provide support and advice on strategies that may support you in engaging your child in home learning.
- At the end of the lesson, where possible, you are encouraged to discuss the learning with your child and think about how both of you felt they got on with their learning.
- Teachers will provide parents and carers with a working from home record of learning tool. Please use the chart below to record the work undertaken as part of home learning.
- Parents and carers are encouraged to send any work and photographs to their class teacher, through their email. Learning outcomes will be recorded on the school's assessment base 'Earwig', to evidence learning at home.

How will you check whether my child is engaging with their work and how will you assess my child's work and progress?

- All of our children and young people have an Educational Health and Care Plan (EHCP).
- The teacher will provide individual learning targets and personalised learning to support your child's EHCP and personal aspirations.
- These learning targets will be linked to this term's curriculum topic and subject areas.
- Every family will receive regular phone calls. We will ask you how your child is progressing with the work, we will ask you if you need any additional support and we will recommend that you send work back to school (where possible) for feedback and so that teachers can evidence learning and progress.
- We encourage staff to speak with the children where possible and will ask them how they are progressing.
- As outlined above, parents and carers have been sent a document to record outcomes of the work undertaken as part of home learning and are encouraged to send any work and photographs to the class teacher, through their email.
